Identifier Declaration – South Australia

Where a photographic identity document cannot be produced, an Identifier Declaration may be used if the verifier or their agent is reasonably satisfied that photographic identity documents cannot be produced.

The Person being Identified and the Identity Declarant are to attend the same face-to-face in-person interview with the Verifier (or their agent).

The Verifier (or their agent) is to verify the identity of the Identity Declarant using at least one Photographic Identity document, and a separate Verification of Identity Certificate.

The Verifier or their agent is to undertake reasonable enquiries to satisfy themselves that the Identity Declarant is:

- a) an Adult; and
- b) an individual who has known the Person Being Identified for more than 12 months; and
- c) not a Relative of the Person Being Identified; and
- d) not a party to the Conveyancing Transaction the Person Being Identified has or is entering into; and
- e) where Section 4 on the Verification of Identity Certificate is used, the Identity Declarant must be a Bank Manager, Community Leader, Court Officer, Medical Doctor, Land Council Officeholder, Local Government Officeholder, Nurse, Public Servant, Australian Legal Practitioner, Licensed Conveyancer or Police Officer.

Who may witness a South Australian Statutory Declaration?

- A Justice of the Peace
- A Notary Public
- A proclaimed member of the police force of the State.
